2. PROJECT OVERVIEW AND REQUIREMENTS

2.1 PROJECT OVERVIEW

Agreement Type	SCI wishes to enter into an agreement with bidder which outlines the key details in which we anticipate purchasing from in the future. Such an agreement is known as a 'Framework Agreement or FWA'. SCI makes no commitment under this agreement until we issue subsequent purchase orders outlining specific products/service or volumes.

3. AWARD CRITERA

SCI is committed to running a fair and transparent tender process and ensuring that all bidders are treated and assessed equally during this tender process.

Bidder responses will be evaluated against three categories of criteria: Essential Criteria, Quality Criteria, Capability Criteria, and Commercial Criteria.

These criteria have been especially created to help SCI determine which bidder is able to offer the best quality and most commercially competitive solution to meet our needs and deliver the most effective programming to our beneficiaries.

3.1 ESSENTIAL CRITERIA

These are criteria, which bidders **must** meet in order to be successful and progress to the next round of evaluation. If a bidder does not meet any of the Essential Criteria, they will be excluded from the tender process. This criteria is scored as Pass or Fail and will not be evaluated against capability, quality and commercial criteria. (See Part 3 Section 2 - Essential Criteria)

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3.2 QUALITY CRITERIA

These are criteria will used to evaluate the bidders' quality assurance system and experience in relation to the requirements of SCI. All bids which pass the Essential Criteria will be evaluated against the same pre-agreed Quality Criteria, which will have been created by a committee of representatives from SCI. (See Part 3 Section 3 - Quality Questions)

3.3 CAPABILITY CRITERIA

These are criteria will used to evaluate the bidders' ability, skill and experience in relation to the requirements of SCI. All bids which pass the Essential Criteria will be evaluated against the same preagreed Capability Criteria, which will have been created by a committee of representatives from SCI. (See Part 3 Section 4 – Capability Questions)

3.4 COMMERCIAL CRITERIA

These criteria will be used to evaluate the commercial competitiveness of a bid. All bids which pass the Essential criteria will be evaluated against the same pre-agreed Commercial Criteria, which have been created by a committee of representatives from SCI. (See Part 3 Section 5 – Commercial Questions)

3.5 SUSTAINABILITY CRITERIA

These criteria will be used to evaluate the sustainable competitiveness of a bid. All bids which pass the Essential criteria will be evaluated against the same pre-agreed Sustainability Criteria, which have been created by a committee of representatives from SCI. (See Part 3 Section 6 – Sustainability Questions)

All Quality, Capability and Commercial Criteria will be weighted accordingly to reflect their importance. The Quality Criteria will account for 35%, the Capability Criteria will account for 35%, the Commercial Criteria will account for 20% and the Sustainability Criteria will account for 10% of the score.

4. BIDDER RESPONSE DOCUMENT

To ensure bidders provide all the required information in order for SCI to be able to effectively evaluate bidders' bids against the Evaluation Criteria, a Bidder Response Document has been created. Bidders must complete the Bidder Response Document and provide various pieces of information as part of their submission.

A copy of the Bidder Response is provided in Part 3 of this Tender Pack.

5. GOOD DISTRIBUTION PRACTICE SITE VISIT

Following the technical evaluation of the Award criteria as described in section 3 above, the SCI office will conduct a Good Distribution Practice (GDP) Site Visit to those suppliers that have passed the award criteria and have been selected as potential suppliers that SCI wishes to engage a long-term arrangement with. The purpose of this site visit checklist is to a physical check in order to evaluate suppliers against internationally recognized Quality Assurance standards.

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6. VETTING

Prior to a bidder supplying any goods / services they must first be vetted and cleared to work with Save the Children. This involves checking bidders and key personnel against Global Watch Lists, Enhanced Due Diligence Lists and Politically Exposed Persons Lists.

The vetting of bidders will be completed after the award decision has been made. If any information provided by the Bidder throughout the tender process is proved to be incorrect during the vetting process (or at any other point), SCI may reverse their award decision.

7.2 DOCUMENTATION FOR SUBMISSION

Bidders wishing to submit a proposal to this Invitation to Tender **must** use the Bidder Response Document template in <u>Part 3</u> of this Tender Pack. Any bids received using different formats will not be accepted.

This document has been created specifically for this tender and allows Bidders to demonstrate their ability to deliver the required goods and / or services. The Bidder Response document is linked to the Essential, Capability and Commercial Criteria, which will be used to evaluate the quality of the bids received. Within the Bidder Response Document instructions are provided on how to complete the document and specific guidance is provided on what information / supporting documentation is required.

The Bidder is expected to sign the statement in Section 3 of the Bidder Response Document to confirm that the bidder response is accurate and can be relied upon

PART 2 - CORE REQUIREMENTS & SPECIFICATIONS

I. INTRODUCTION TO HEALTHCARE COMMODITIES AT SAVE THE CHILDREN

Save the Children works across thematic areas to address the unique and complex causes of illness, malnutrition, and death in mothers, newborns and young children with the aim of ensuring that no child dies of preventable causes before their fifth birthday.

Within the health and nutrition thematic area, Save the Children supports global and country-level efforts to achieve universal coverage of a package of proven, high-impact maternal, newborn and child health and nutrition interventions. We categorize these interventions by the following sub-thematic areas of work:

- Adolescent, Sexual, and Reproductive Health (ASRH)
- Child Health (CH)
- Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV)
- Maternal, Infant, and Young Child Nutrition (MIYCN)
- o Maternal, Newborn, and Reproductive Health (MNRH)
- Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

2. SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

Save the Children International is seeking suppliers for a variety of healthcare commodities, including drugs, consumables, and medical equipment. These have been divided into groups, which may ultimately be let as separate contracts, or amalgamated into one contract depending on the offers from Bidders.

The groups are as listed below, with full contents of each in the worksheet 'Pharmaceutical Tender Annexes 4 – A: Product List'. They include items regularly bought by Save the Children; however, they do not represent an exclusive list and contracted suppliers may be required to supply other items. Bidders are requested to indicate in the Pharmaceutical Tender Response which groups they wish to bid for (refer to Annex A – Product list).

- Pharmaceuticals
- Medical Consumables
- Medical Equipment
- Laboratory and diagnostics
- Emergency Health kits
- Vaccines
- Specialized Nutrition Food (RUTF, RUSF)

Save the Children aims to procure healthcare commodities that meet international standards for quality, obtained from suppliers that can assure the quality of their products in line with WHO's Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP) and Model Quality Assurance System for Procurement Agencies (MQAS), and that are in line with the National Essential Drug List (NEDL) in the country in which they will be used.

3. PRODUCT REQUIREMENTS AND SPECIFICATIONS

4. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Below are Save the Children's specific quality assurance requirements for procurement agencies, distributors and wholesalers; for manufacturers of drugs; for finished pharmaceutical products; for medical devices; and for vaccines.

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4.1 Specific requirements for Finished Pharmaceutical Products:

- must be manufactured in line with the WHO international standards of Good Manufacturing Practices
- must be manufactured to conform to WHO International Pharmacopeia standards, European Pharmacopoeia standards (EP), British Pharmacopoeia standards (BP) or the United States Pharmacopeia Convention (USP), or equivalent
- must be batch tested and certified for quality and conformity to their specifications
- should be authorised by the National Drug Regulatory Authority of the country of destination for orders placed
- At all times must be stored or transported at the required temperature-controlled conditions in accordance with the manufacturers instruction as indicated on the packing
- must have a remaining shelf life of at least 2 years, or for products with a shelf life of less than two years at time of manufacture, at least 75% of the life must be remaining
- must be packaged and labelled as follows:

Labelling: All drugs should be labelled with the following information in English or French as requested:

- International non-proprietary name of the active ingredient
- Dosage form (tablet, ampoule, vial, etc) and way of administration
- Quantity of active ingredients in the dosage form
- Batch number
- Expiry date
- Specific storage conditions
- Name and address of manufacturer
- Number of units per packing

All primary packaging (blisters, flasks, tubes, ampoules, vials) should be labelled with at least the following information:

- International non-proprietary name of the active ingredients
- Quantity of active ingredients
- Batch number
- Expiry date
- Name of the manufacturer
- Dosage form (tablet, ampoule, vial, etc) and way of administration

All sterilised medical material should be labelled with:

- Identification of the product
- Batch number and date of sterilisation
- Expiry date
- Name of the manufacturer

Directions for use and precautions must be given in leaflets (package inserts). They are not an alternative to labelling but provide supplementary information. The leaflet should contain:

- International non-proprietary name of the active ingredient and excipients
 - Dosage form (tablet, ampoule, vial, etc) and way of administration
 - Quantity of active ingredients in the dosage form
 - Pharmacological therapeutic family
 - Therapeutical indications, instructions of use and standard policies
 - Side effects, incompatibilities, contraindications, and use of precautions
 - Pharmaceutical interactions
 - Specific storage conditions
 - Name of manufacturer

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Products requiring reconstitution before use, e.g. powder for injection or vaccines, should have relevant instructions on the label, specifying that only the diluent supplied by the manufacturer should be used and the volume and nature of the diluent to be added to reconstitute the vaccine.

Packaging: The goods should be properly packed, to the following standards, and labelled as above:

- Tablets and capsules should be packed in sealed, waterproof containers
- Liquids should be packed in unbreakable, leak-proof bottles and containers
- Ampoules should be packed in plastic or in carton trays (5 to 10) and all trays packed in outer cartons. Preferably, ampoules should be one-ended and auto-breakable
- Light-sensitive products (e.g. ergometrine) should be packed in brown glass ampoules

Outer cartons should:

- be of strong, export-quality material to withstand rough handling and climate conditions during transport and storage

- only contain products with the same expiry date and batch numbers, this should be printed on the carton as well as on the immediate containers.

4.2 Specific requirements for medical devices, equipment and diagnostics

- Manufacturer demonstrates implementation of the Quality Management System (QMS) by a conformity assessment body recognized by one of the GHTF country funding members (Australia, Canada, EU, Japan and USA)
- When applies, manufacturers have a valid (not outdated) ISO 13485 certification that includes the medical devices distributed.
- For medical devices class I nonsterile and non-measurement, a declaration of conformity should be available
- At all times must be stored or transported at the required temperature-controlled conditions in accordance with the manufacturers instruction as indicated on the packing
- Should preferably be authorised by a GHTF founding member country (Australia, Canada, EU, Japan and USA).
- For in vitro diagnostic tests (if those tests are covered by the pre-qualification program) should be prequalified by the WHO pre-qualification program
- For condoms and IUD should be pre-qualified by UNFPA (United Nations Population Fund)

4.3 Specific requirements for vaccines and monitoring cold chain:

- Vaccine vial monitor (VVM): The vaccines present data confirming that it has a thermostability profile that will enable it to be matched to a current WHO approved VVM type (VVM2, VVM7, VVM14 or VVM30) or a future VVM type approved by WHO (WHO/V&B/99.187, WHO/IVB/07.048)
- Anti-microbial preservative (absence, reduced concentration thiomersal or alternative preservative: Only for vaccines that are in ready to use (no reconstitution) 2-dose vial presentations or are not live attenuated, in multidose presentations and require reconstitution should be adequately preserved (WHO/EPI)
- Antigenic stability after reconstitution. Only vaccines that are in multidose presentations; and require reconstitution of one or more components. The components of the vaccine must show antigenic stability for 28 days after reconstitution.
- The vaccines in a prefilled injection device should include an auto-disable (AD) feature (WHO/V&B/99.259)

- The vaccines should be dosed in standardized volumes (e.g. 0.5, 0.1, 0.05 ml) that can be easily measured using available AD syringes (WHO EPI).
- In addition to the packaging information for Finished Pharmaceutical Products listed above, the following applies for vaccines:
 - Instructions for use of the vaccine and information concerning contraindications and the reactions that may follow vaccination
 - Information on the reduced stability of the vaccine if exposed to temperatures higher than that stated on the label
 - Warnings that the vaccine should be protected from direct sunlight
 - A statement that the reconstituted vaccine should be used as soon as possible, or should be stored at 2°- 8°C, protected from direct sunlight and used within six hours.

In addition to the terms defined in the Cover Letter, in these Conditions, the following definitions apply:

(a) **Award Criteria** - the award criteria set out in the Invitation to Tender.

(b) **Potential supplier** - a person or organisation who bids for the tender.

(c) **Conditions** - the conditions set out in this 'Conditions of Tendering 'document.

(d) **Cover Letter** - the cover letter attached to the Tender Information Pack.

(e) **Goods and/or Services** - everything purchased by SCI under the contract.

(f) Invitation to Tender - the Tender Information, these Conditions, SCI's Terms and

Conditions of Purchase, SCI's Child Safeguarding Policy, SCI's Anti Bribery and Corruption Policy and the IAPG Code of Conduct.

(g) **SCI** - Save the Children International (formerly known as The International Save the Children Alliance Charity), a charitable company limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales (company number 03732267; charity number 1076822) whose registered office is at St Vincent House, 30 Orange Street, London, WC2H 7HH.

(h) **Specification** - any specification for the Goods and/or Services, including any related plans and drawings, supplied by SCI to the Supplier, or specifically produced by the Supplier for SCI, in connection with the tender.

(i) **Supplier** - the party which provides Goods and/or Services to SCI.

I. The Contract

All communications from Potential suppliers to SCI relating to the tender must be in writing and addressed to the person identified in this Invitation to Tender. Any request for information should be received at least 5 days before the Closing Date, as defined in the Invitation to Tender. Where appropriate responses to questions submitted by any Potential supplier will be circulated by SCI to all Potential supplier s to ensure fairness in the process.

4. Acceptance of tenders

SCI may, unless the Potential supplier expressly stipulates to the contrary in the tender, accept whatever part of a tender that SCI so wishes. SCI is under no obligation to accept the lowest or any tender.

5. Alternative offer

If the Potential supplier wishes to propose modifications to the tender (which may provide a better way to achieve SCI's Specification) these may, at SCI's discretion, be considered as an Alternative Offer. The Potential supplier must make any Alternative Offer in a separate letter to accompany the Tender. SCI is under no obligation to accept Alternative Offers.

6. Prices



Tendered prices must be shown as both inclusive of and exclusive of any Value Added Tax chargeable or any similar tax (if applicable). Prices must be clearly identified as price per unit of measure.

7. No reimbursement of tender expenses

Expenses incurred in the preparation and dispatch of the tender will not be reimbursed.

9. Award Procedure

SCI's Procurement Committee will review the Potential suppliers and their tenders to determine, in accordance with the Award Criteria, whether they will award the contract to any one of them.

10. Information and Record Keeping

SCI shall consider any reasonable request from any unsuccessful Potential supplier for feedback on its bid and, where it is appropriate and proportionate to do so, provide the unsuccessful Potential supplier with reasons why the bid was rejected. Where applicable, this information shall be provided within 30 business days from (but not including) the date on which SCI receives the request.

II. Anti-Bribery and Corruption

APPENDIX 2 – SAVE THE CHILDRENS SAFEGUARDING POLICY

Our values and principles

Child abuse is when anyone under 18 years of age is being harmed or isn't being looked after properly. The abuse can be physical, sexual, emotional or neglect. The abuse and exploitation of children happens in all countries and societies across the world. Child abuse is never acceptable.

It is expected that all who work with Save the Children are committed to safeguard children whom they are in contact with.

What we do

Save the Children is committed to safeguard children through the following means:

Awareness: Ensuring that all staff and those who work with Save the Children are aware of the problem of child abuse and the risks to children.

Prevention: Ensuring, through awareness and good practice, that staff and those who work with Save the Children minimise the risks to children.

Reporting: Ensuring that you are clear on what steps to take where concerns arise regarding the safety of children.

Responding: Ensuring that action is taken to support and protect children where concerns arise regarding possible abuse.

To help you clarify our safeguarding approach, we list here examples of the behaviour by a representative of Save the Children which are prohibited. These include but are not limited to:

- 1. Hitting or otherwise physically assaulting or physically abusing children.
- 2. Engaging in sexual activity or having a sexual relationship with anyone under the age of 18 years regardless of the age of majority/consent or custom locally. Mistaken belief in the age of a child is not a defence.
- 3. Developing relationships with children which could in any way be deemed exploitative or abusive.
- 4. Acting in ways that may be abusive in any way or may place a child at risk of abuse.
- 5. Using language, making suggestions or offering advice which is inappropriate, offensive or abusive.
- 6. Behaving physically in a manner which is inappropriate or sexually provocative.
- 7. Sleeping in the same bed or same room as a child, or having a child/children with whom one is working to stay overnight at a home unsupervised.
- 8. Doing things for children of a personal nature that they can do themselves.
- 9. Condoning, or participating in, behaviour of children which is illegal, unsafe or abusive.

- 10. Acting in ways intended to shame, humiliate, belittle or degrade children, or otherwise perpetrate any form of emotional abuse.
- 11. Discriminating against, showing unfair differential treatment or favour to particular children to the exclusion of others.
- 12. Spending excessive time alone with children away from others.
- 13. Placing oneself in a position where one is made vulnerable to allegations of misconduct.

In order that the above standards of reporting and responding are met, this is what is expected of you:

If you are worried that a child or young person is being abused or neglected, (such as in points 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, 9 and 10 above for example) or you are concerned about the inappropriate behaviour of an employee, or someone working with Save the Children, towards a child or young person, then you are obliged to:

- act quickly and get help
- support and respect the child
- where possible, ensure that the child is safe
- contact your Save the Children manager with your concerns immediately (or their senior manager if necessary)
- keep any information confidential to you and the manager.

- 22. Condoning, or participating in, behaviour of children which is illegal, unsafe or abusive.
- 23. Acting in ways intended to shame, humiliate, belittle or degrade children, or otherwise perpetrate any form of emotional abuse.
- 24. Discriminating against, showing unfair differential treatment or favour to particular children to the exclusion of others.
- 25. Spending excessive time alone with children away from others.
- 26. Placing oneself in a position where one is made vulnerable to allegations of misconduct.

In order that the above standards of reporting and responding are met, this is what is expected of you:

If you are worried that a child or young person is being abused or neglected, (such as in points 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, 9 and 10 above for example) or you are concerned about the inappropriate behaviour of an employee, or someone working with Save the Children, towards a child or young person, then you are obliged to:

- act quickly and get help
- support and respect the child
- where possible, ensure that the child is safe
- contact your Save the Children manager with your concerns immediately (or their senior manager if necessary)



• keep any information confidential to you and the manager.

APPENDIX 3 - SAVE THE CHILDRENS ANTI BRIBERY & CORRUPTION POLICY

Our values and principles

Save the Children does not allow any partner, supplier, sub-contractor, agent or any individual engaged by Save the Children to behave in a corrupt manner while carrying out Save the Children's work.

What we do

Save the Children is committed to preventing acts of bribery and corruption through the following means:

Awareness: Ensuring that all staff and those who work with Save the Children are aware of the problem of bribery and corruption.

Prevention: Ensuring, through awareness and good practice, that staff and those who work with Save the Children minimise the risks of bribery and corruption.

Reporting: Ensuring that all staff and those who work with Save the Children are clear on what steps to take where concerns arise regarding allegations of bribery and corruption.

Responding: Ensuring that action is taken to support and protect assets and identifying cases of bribery and corruption.

To help you identify cases of bribery and corruption, behaviour which amounts to corruption includes but is not limited to:

a) <u>Paying or Offering a Bribe</u> – where a person improperly offers, gives or promises any form of material benefit or other advantage, whether in cash or in kind, to another in order to influence their conduct in any way.

b) <u>Receiving or Requesting a Bribe</u> – where a person improperly requests, agrees to receive or accepts any form of material benefit or other advantage, whether in cash or in kind, which influences or is designed to influence the individual's conduct in any way.

c) <u>Receiving or Paying a so-called 'Grease' or 'Facilitation' payment</u> – where a person improperly receives something of value from another party for performing a service or other action that they were required by their employment to do anyway.

d) <u>Nepotism or Patronage</u> – where a person improperly uses their employment to favour or materially benefit friends, relatives or other associates in some way. For example, through the awarding of contracts or other material advantages.

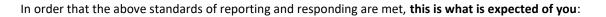
e) <u>Embezzlement</u> - where a person improperly uses funds, property, resources or other assets that belong to an organisation or individual.

f) <u>Receiving a so-called 'Kickback' Payment</u> – where a person improperly receives a share of funds, a commission, material benefit or other advantage from a supplier as a result of their involvement in a corrupt bid or tender process.

g) <u>Collusion</u> – where a person improperly colludes with others to circumvent, undermine or otherwise ignore rules, policies or guidance.

h) <u>Abuse of a Position of Trust</u> – where a person improperly uses their position within their organisation to materially benefit themselves or any other party.

Invitation to tender



You have a duty to protect the assets of Save the Children from any form of corruption. Furthermore, you must immediately report any suspicion of bribery or corruption to the Save the Children senior management team or Country Director and not to anyone else. Failure to report will be treated as serious and may result in termination of any agreement with Save the Children.

You are obliged to:-

- act quickly and get help
- encourage your own staff to report on bribery and corruption
- contact the Save the Children senior management team or Country Director with your concerns immediately (or their senior manager if necessary)
- keep any information confidential to you and the manager.

Attempted corruption is as serious as the actual acts and will be treated in the same way under this policy.

APPENDIX 4 – SAVE THE CHILDRENS HUMAN TRAFFICKING & MODERN SLAVERY POLICY

1. Our values and principles

Save the Children does not allow any partner, supplier, sub-contractor, agent or any individual engaged by Save the Children to engage in human trafficking or modern slavery.

This policy applies to all persons working for us or on our behalf in any capacity, including employees at all levels, directors, officers, agency workers, seconded workers, volunteers, interns, agents, contractors, external consultants, third-party representatives and business partners.

2. What is human trafficking and modern slavery?

The Modern Slavery Act (MSA) 2015 covers four activities:

Slavery	Exercising powers of ownership over a person
Servitude	The obligation to provide services is imposed by the use of coercion
Forced or compulsory labour	Work or services are exacted from a person under the menace of any penalty and for which the person has not offered themselves voluntarily
Human trafficking	Arranging or facilitating the travel of another person with a view to their exploitation

Modern slavery, including human trafficking, is a crime and a violation of fundamental human rights. It takes various forms, such as slavery, servitude, forced and compulsory labour and human trafficking, all of which have in common the deprivation of a person's liberty by another in order to exploit them for personal or commercial gain. We have a zero-tolerance approach to modern slavery and we are committed to acting ethically and with integrity in all our business dealings and relationships and to implementing and enforcing effective systems and controls to ensure modern slavery is not taking place anywhere in our own business or in any of our supply chains.

We are also committed to ensuring there is transparency in our own business and in our approach to tackling modern slavery throughout our supply chains, consistent with our national and international disclosure obligations, and shall comply with all applicable laws, statutes, regulations and codes from time to time in force, including:

- UK Modern Slavery Act 2015 (see above);
- US Trafficking Victims Protection Act 2000;
- USAID ADS 303 Mandatory Standard Provision, Trafficking in Persons (July 2015); and
- International Labour Standards on Child Labour and Forced Labour.

3. Our approach to preventing human trafficking and modern slavery

Save the Children is committed to preventing human trafficking and modern slavery, including through the following means:

Awareness: Ensuring that all staff and those who work with Save the Children are aware of the problem of human trafficking and modern slavery.

Save the Children

Prevention: Ensuring, through awareness and good practice, that staff and those who work with Save the Children minimise the risks of human trafficking and modern slavery.

Reporting: Ensuring that all staff and those who work with Save the Children are clear on what steps to take where concerns arise regarding allegations of human trafficking and modern slavery.

Responding: Ensuring that action is taken to identify and address cases of human trafficking and modern slavery.

To help you identify cases of human trafficking and modern slavery, the following are examples of prohibited categories of behaviour:

- a. <u>'Chattel slavery'</u>, in which one person owns another person.
- b. 'Bonded labour' or 'debt bondage', which is when a person's work is the security for a debt effectively the person is on 'a long lease' which they cannot bring to an end, and so cannot leave their 'employer'. Often the conditions of employment can be such that the labourer can't pay off their debt and is stuck for life, because of low wages, deductions for food and lodging, and high interest rates.
- c. 'Serfdom', which is when a person has to live and work for another on the other's land.
- d. <u>Other forms of forced labour</u>, such as when passports are confiscated (sometimes by unscrupulous recruitment agencies) from migrant workers to keep them in bondage, or when a worker is 'kept in captivity' as a domestic servant. If a supplier or contractor appears to impose excessively harsh working conditions, or excessively poor wages, then you should always be alive to the possibility that a form of forced labour is occurring, and take care with your due diligence.
- e. 'Child Slavery', which is the transfer of a young person (under 18) to another person so that the young person can be exploited. Child labour may, in fact, be a form of child slavery, and should not be tolerated. See the Save the Children Child Safeguarding Policy for further details.
- f. 'Marital and sexual slavery', including forced marriage, the purchase of women for marriage, forced prostitution, or other sexual exploitation of individuals through the use or threat of force or other penalty.

4. The Commitment we expect from commercial partners

We expect the same high standards from all of our contractors, suppliers and other business partners, and as part of our contracting processes, we may include specific prohibitions against the use of forced, compulsory or trafficked labour, or anyone held in slavery or servitude, whether adults or children, and we expect that our suppliers will hold their own suppliers to the same high standards.

APPENDIX 5 – CODE OF CONDUCT FOR IAPG AGENCIES & SUPPLIERS



Suppliers and manufacturers to Non Governmental Organisations (NGO's) should be aware of the Code of Conduct initiatives that the Inter-Agency Procurement Group (IAPG) support. This information is to advise you, our suppliers, of the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) element in our supplier relationships.

- Goods and services purchased are produced and developed under conditions that do not involve the abuse or exploitation of any persons.
- Goods produced and delivered by organisations subscribe to no exploitation of children
- Goods produced and manufactured have the least impact on the environment

Code of Conduct for Suppliers:

Goods and services are produced and delivered under conditions where:

- Employment is freely chosen
- The rights of staff to freedom of association and collective bargaining are respected.
- Living wages are paid
- There is no exploitation of children
- Working conditions are safe and hygienic
- Working hours are not excessive
- No discrimination is practiced
- Regular employment is provided
- No harsh or inhumane treatment of staff is allowed.

Environmental Standards:

Suppliers should as a minimum comply with all statutory and other legal requirements relating to environmental impacts of their business. Areas to be considered are:

- Waste Management
- Packaging and Paper
- Conservation
- Energy Use
- Sustainability

Business Behaviour:

IAPG members will seek alternative sources where the conduct of suppliers demonstrably violates anyone's basic human rights, and there is no willingness to address the situation within a reasonable timeframe.

IAPG members will seek alternative sources where companies in the supply chain are involved in the manufacture of arms or the sale of arms to governments which systematically violate the human rights of their citizens.

Qualifications to the statement



Where speed of deployment is essential in saving lives, IAPG members will purchase necessary goods and services from the most appropriate available source.
